From the pastor's desk ...

Dear Friends!

Mark 16:3 asks the question "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" This is an important question on that first Easter morning. The women are going to the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus. Obviously, they have to have access to the body if they are going to anoint it. Maybe, when the anointing committee met hurriedly and briefly the night before, this matter of moving the stone was discussed. We don't know that because Mark's account of that first Easter morning is tight and concise, not flooded with details.

From the limited dialogue in Mark 16:1-8, the question appears to be asked for the first time while the women make their way to the tomb. Their inability to answer the question does not turn them around and send them back home. They may have been hoping to run into other mourners at the tomb that morning. Surely, there will be someone there to help with the stone. Otherwise, their trip is in vain. They keep walking. They keep walking toward that obstacle that stands between them and Easter, Between them and resurrection, between them and hope. They keep walking. When they look up, the barrier between them and hope is already rolled away. The obstacle between them and resurrection has been moved. The Barricade between them and Easter has been breached.

The persistence of these women teaches us something crucial about resurrection on the first Easter morning and about many of the experiences of resurrection hope since that morning. Walking toward the very obstacle that would keep them from seeing Jesus is what put them in position to witness the empty tomb, resurrection, and Easter. They could not move that stone. It made little sense for them to go without someone else to help them. They went anyway. Easter happened.

Easter has happened again at Greensboro United Church of Christ. The day itself was a wonderful day. Gathering to worship with such committed and thoughtful followers of Jesus was exhilarating. I wish you all could have been here. For me, the best thing about Easter and everyday at GUCC is knowing that whatever obstacle we face, we face it with the hope born on that first Easter.

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MISSION MOMENT

As we move into a new season there are families and communities in need. Church World Service counts on volunteers to assemble and send kits to help meet this need. They are currently rebuilding their stock of kits to respond to disasters at home and abroad during 2018. There are three types of kits that are needed. Please consider donating items for one or more kits.

Hygiene Kits make the difference between sickness and health for struggling families. Each kit includes: One hand towel @ 16" x 28", one washcloth, one wide-tooth comb, one nail clipper, one bar of soap (bath size in wrapper), one toothbrush (in original packaging), and six standard size Band-Aids.

School Kits are distributed to children in impoverished communities and refugee camps and provide basic tools for learning. Each kit includes: One pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip), three 70-count spiral notebooks, one 30- centimeter ruler (12"), one hand held pencil sharpener, one large eraser, six new pencils with erasers, and one box of 24 crayons.

Emergency cleanup buckets help people after a flood, tornado, or other disaster. Each kit includes: One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid, four scouring pads, seven sponges, including one large, one scrub brush, eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Easy Wipes), one 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent, one 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap, one 12-16 oz. bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles), one package of 48-50 clothespins, clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft., five dust masks, two pairs heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-surgical), one pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather, 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and removed from carton, one 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent.

Shopping lists for each type of kit and a box for donations are available in Fellowship Hall. Our goal is to have all materials purchased and dropped off by the end of April. We will be delivering the completed kits at the beginning of May. Thank you for supporting this project.

A big thank you to Cara Hill for her solo of the *Holy City* at our Easter Service. It was a joyful opening and was in the spirit of our mission to *Serve God Through Music*. We continue our musical offerings for the month of April:

Apr. 8th — One of my sacred music professors while I was at Westminster Choir College was Erik Routley, who inspired many beginning composers. One of those composers was Gordon Young (1919-1998) who wrote today's anthem *My Master from a Garden Rose*. Mr. Young was originally from Kansas with over 800 organ and choral works to his name. This piece is in the madrigal style with text describing how Jesus was laid in the tomb with tender hands, and perfumed with rare spices to rest amid the roses.

Apr. 15th — God so Loved the World is a sacred piece written in the "block" style (think hymn-like) based on the text John 3:16-17. John Stainer (1840-1901) was a prolific and popular composer during Victorian England and wrote books about harmony. It is the harmony in this anthem that makes this work so unique and beautiful. The text in this anthem reminds us "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that who so believeth, should not perish."

Apr. 22nd — A quiet, personal choral approach with heartfelt text and a memorable melody, *Just One God* begins with the solo: "No other god guides destiny, no other god can set you free, no other god, there's only one." The choir then responds with musical layers that convey a lush, contemporary sound that includes lovely piano arpeggios and suspensions. Living composer Herb Frombach lives in Pennsylvania and is now retired from a career that included teaching High School music and was a Minister of Music at a local church. Be sure to listen for the "back and forth" of the choral parts.

Apr. 29th — With text from John, *I am the Vine* is the musical partner to Ed's sermon on this Sunday. This anthem by Canadian composer Clifford McCormick, is part of his collection of 17 pieces included in *Anthems from Scripture*. The imagery in this music helps the listener experience the deep connection between text and music, and reminds us that "For without Me, you can do nothing."
