From the pastor's desk ...

In our part of the world, Christmas comes at the darkest time of the year. The daylight hours are short and the nights are long. In my younger days, I used to be disdainful of the more excessive displays of Christmas lights on the houses I would pass, as I drove by in the December darkness. But, in more recent years, I've come to understand and appreciate them. They seem like a brave gesture of hope flung up against the black of the night sky.

When we listen to the news, it seems like a dark time in our world, as well. Terrorist attacks shake our security, and the terrible plight of the Syrian refugees has been called the greatest humanitarian crisis of our age. Wars continue, poverty is rampant, and children take up guns to shoot their classmates.

How, then, can we celebrate Christmas? How do we dare to reach out for Christmas joy? Perhaps we need to remember that, two thousand years ago, the world was just as dark, just as filled with oppression, violence and war as it is now. In the Greek plays of Jesus' time, playwrights used a device known as Deus ex Machina — which means "a god let down upon the stage from a machine." When the characters in a play had managed to get themselves into such a mess that it seemed nothing could save them, the deus ex machina would appear. A god would descend with smoke and mirrors and lots of noise, and all would be made right. This, I'm sure, was a reassuring image of what it means to have God intervene in human affairs. But we have been given a very different image of how God works — the image of an infant, born into poverty, in a stable in Bethlehem.

At Christmas time, we often use the image of Christ being born in us. Our celebration is not just about something that happened two thousand years ago. It's also about the newness of life that comes to us each time the spirit of Christ is born in our hearts. One of the most beautiful traditions of the Christmas season is the Christmas Eve candlelight service. We light candles to symbolize the light of Christ, reborn each year at Christmas. As we light the Christ candle, we remember what it means to have God come among us in this way — as a tiny baby, a small point of light against the darkness. Then we pass the light from the Christ candle to one another, until the whole sanctuary is filled with light. Each time I look around a sanctuary, on Christmas Eve, and see all the faces shining in the soft candlelight, I am reminded that the light of one candle may not seem like much, but what a bold and brave shining we make when we hold our lights together!

So how do we celebrate at this dark time? We remember the light that came into the world in the stable in Bethlehem — the light that still comes into the world, the light no darkness can overcome. And we make a decision to be a part of that light, to think and speak and act in ways that add to the light, and not to the darkness, in our world. And we look around at all the other bearers of the light and recognize that we are not alone, that we are never, ever alone. We are surrounded by friends, and by the "cloud of witnesses" of all who have gone before us, all bound together in the love of the One who came to be light for the world.

There are so many neighbors we don't often see, so many conversations to have, not to mention hugs and news. The lunch is so important to slow us down to reconnect with those in the village and beyond, and having cheerful children serving was a delight."*

Many thanks to the young people and members of the Christian Ed Board, who cooked and served the delicious soups, chili, breads and desserts. And thanks to all the clever artisans, local and around the world, who brought us a multitude of useful and artistic items, including Christmas wreaths, tasty crepes, beautiful candles, lovely hats, clothes, paintings, and much more. A volunteer from the Help-Kids-India sold many Indian items to benefit their projects; and lots of coffee and chocolate disappeared from the Fair-Trade Table. The SERRV table itself was filled with an amazing selection of gift items and one of our church members displayed attractive note cards to benefit SERRV

Financially, the SERRV gross receipts were \$2,112 and we sent a very small box back to the SERRV folks who had sent them to us on consignment. CHILDREN AND YOUTH

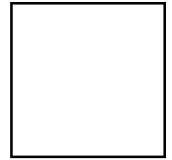
Big thanks to the children, youth, and parents who helped make our fundraising lunch at the Alternative Giving Fair a success!

Choral Season

"To everything there is a season" it is written....in my family we have deer season, football season, baseball season. One of the most important seasons for me is now: Choral Season. Choral music is played in the stores, on the radio and TV, in downtown shopping areas and of course, church. We have some lovely Advent and Christmas music for our services this month:

Dec. 6th — *They that Wait Upon the Lord* contains the text of Isaiah 40:-1-2, 11-31. Cara Hill will help us tell the story as she offers us her beautiful mezzo-soprano voice as our soloist.

Dec. 13th — *Light the Advent Candle* is a fervently performed anthem that reminds us to keep the advent candle burning in our hearts. Hal will solo with the choir as we remind ourselves of the anticipation of Christmas.

Dec 20th — *Prepare!* This anthem joyfully and rhythmically speaks of the hope, peace and love of the upcoming birth of Jesus. It is fun to sing and has a surprise ending!

Dec. 24th — *Carol of the Little Angel* is a gentle, flowing lullaby by the great sacred composer Don Besig. It will be enhanced by a soloist and instrument, as we make our way to Christmas. The sanctuary will be filled with beautiful early music by our consort before and during the service. Cara will solo with the choir for a very special antiphonal prelude.

One of our anthems says: light the candles one by one.....which we will continue to do as we *serve God through music* during this very special season and all seasons upcoming.
