From the pastor's desk ...

In Mark, chapter 4, we encounter Jesus and the disciples crossing to the other side. As the storm is raging, Jesus is asleep. Frantically, the disciples awaken him. Mark tells us, "He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm."

2000 years ago, Jesus is in the boat, in the storm speaking to the storm. 2000 years later, more often than not, the followers of Jesus are standing on the dock or perched on the deck of a vessel that oozes privilege speaking not to the storm, but to the victims of the storm. We hear them say things like:

"You wouldn't be in this storm if you had studied harder and stayed in school."

"I can't imagine him doing something like that. What did you do to encourage-him?"

"If you want a wage you can live on, get a better job."

"You would not be facing this surgery if you had eaten less red meat and more kale and quinoa."

The ways we blame those who are suffering through life's storms is virtually endless. Jesus never taught us to do that. We created that ourselves for our on peace of mind. So long as the victim is a fault then we can maintain the illusion that a storm like that could never happen to us.

What Jesus did teach his followers to do was to speak up for those who are on the other side, the outside. This is a lesson that has been well learned here at Greensboro United Church of Christ. Group of us just spent the last six Mondays in Montpelier speaking to systemic causes of poverty and racism in our country with the Poor People's Campaign. Some of us just finished another year of speaking hope into the lives of students at Lakeview School. Our whole community gathered for a meal that spoke encouragement and support for refugees in our state. This past Sunday we spoke of our openness and affirmation for all God's children as we reaffirmed our Open and Affirming Covenant.

Because we, the people of the Greensboro United Church of Christ, believe that all persons are loved and valued by God, all are invited and welcomed into our church family. We are committed to following the teachings of Jesus to love all people, and we seek to be an expression of God's love in the world.

We invite and welcome into our community persons of every sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression, ability, age, race, nationality, ethnicity, economic and social status, faith background and family structure.

All persons are encouraged to participate in the life, leadership, ministry and mission of this church as we seek to grow together in a safe, nurturing community of faith.

How exciting it is to serve with people who are willing to model the practices of Jesus with their words and actions. Let us continue to speak words of hope and encouragement to those who are battered by life's storms. Let us not grow weary of raising our voices in opposition to the storms that torment and oppress those whom God has called us to love.

THE MUSIC CORNER

With the arrival of summer you will notice we in the choir shed our robes during worship. This brings us great comfort as we lead services and our mission of *Serving God through music*. We hope you experience comfort as well during our July offerings:

July 1st— During the 1970's Lani Smith composed many sacred works for Lorenz Publishing Co. One of our favorites is *Blessed Is the Nation* that we perform today, a majestic Psalm based anthem.

The text reminds us "blessed is the nation whose God is Lord". Be sure to listen for the trumpet-like sounds from the organ that help bring this piece to life.

July 8th— On this communion Sunday we have a lovely arrangement of *Lamb of God*. This anthem is originally from a 1540 German chorale and arranged by F. Melius Christiansen (1871-1955). Christiansen was a Norwegian-born violinist and conductor in the Lutheran choral tradition, who was on the faculty of St. Olaf College in Minnesota and famous for his arrangement of *Fairest Lord Jesus* he titled *Beautiful Savior* which is St. Olaf's official song. This anthem is to be sung as smoothly as possible in a slow tempo and has beautiful harmonies and suspensions.

July 15th— From our collection *Anthems From Scripture* we bring you *Trust in the Lord* this Sunday. Based on Proverbs 3, this broad-based anthem will begin with a solo voice: "Trust in the Lord with all thy heart" with the choir responding. Be sure to listen for the soft prayer-like middle section which brings a certain reverence to this musical offering.

July 22nd— Living prolific composer Joseph Martin (1959-), a native of North Carolina, published this anthem "O Lord, Our Lord, How Excellent Thy Name" in 1992. With a driving tempo and crisp fugue shared between the soprano and alto's and tenor's and basses, this 2-part up tempo anthem is fun to sing and listen to.

July 29th—W. Glen Darst (1896-1986), an American sacred arranger, took text by Scottish-born James Montgomery (1771-1854, hymnodist, poet, editor) and created *Stand Up, and Bless the Lord* in 1959. This bold anthem begins with all voices in unison : "Stand up, bless the Lord, Ye people of His choice, with heart and soul and voice." It concludes with a definitive sustained loud "Amen." The Early Music folks will play selections from Johann Christoph Petz's Suite 1 during the prelude and postlude. Sonia Dunbar and Gina Jenkins on recorders, Tom Anastasio on gamba and Bronwyn Massé on harpsichord

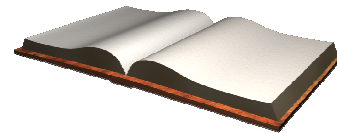
